# RIBA Education Statistics 2019/20

The RIBA Education Department conducts an annual survey of schools of architecture; this data establishes key facts about architectural education in the UK. Collection of accurate data is essential for any professional organisation; this survey allows the RIBA to understand trends in this sector, and forms the basis for responses to government, media, and other bodies. This document describes the results of the survey for 2019/20, comparing results with figures for the last five years.

We would like to thank all heads of architecture and departmental administrators for responding so positively to this year's survey, and for providing all the detailed information we require. We are pleased to report that all UK RIBA validated schools participated in this year's survey.

In this most difficult of years, Schools of Architecture continue to grow. The total number of students studying architecture is touching 20,000. There are nearly 17,000 students at Parts 1 and 2 in Validated Schools, another 1,000 students in Candidate Schools plus nearly 2,000 students who sat their Part 3 examinations. More applications were received than in any year before; and more students passed their Part 3 examinations than ever before.

Given this picture of growth it is perhaps a little surprising to see that the number of students entering Part 1 and Part 2 this year has edged slightly down. These falls are entirely accounted for by fewer new entrants coming from EU countries, while at the same time, more students are entering both Part 1 and Part 2 from other countries outside the UK or EU. The number of teaching staff has also edged lower, meaning this is the first year since 2015/16 that there are now more than 12 students, on average, for each member of the teaching staff.

We are pleased to note that the number of part-time students has risen by 5 per cent, which can be attributed to the growing number of schools offering apprenticeship provision and thereby offering different ways to access architecture education.


There is now a near equal gender balance amongst students at all stages; female students account for 54 per cent of applicants, 53 per cent of new entrants to Part 1 and 52 per cent of new entrants to Part 2. For those passing Part 3, male student form the majority for now, accounting for 56 per cent of passes.







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#### Geographic movement of students

This new analysis of students, now in its second full year, tracks cohorts of students as they move between home, Part 1 School and Part 2 School.

More than 70 per cent of students who live in the North began their Part 1 studies this year in the same geographic region as their family home. This rises to 84 per cent for students in Northern Ireland and 98 per cent in Scotland. A similar pattern emerges between Parts 1 and 2. The proportion of students who studied Part 1 in London who then remain in the capital for Part 2 is also high.

Students travel further from home, on average, to study for Part 1 than they do for Part 2.

Figure 1: Average distance between home and School, new entrants to Part 1, 2019/20




Figure 2: Average distance between home and School, new entrants to Parts 1 and 2, analysed by location of School, 2019/20





Figure 3: Geographic movement of students between the location of the student's home (left), location of the Part 1 School (centre) and Part 2 School (right), 2019/20 (incomplete sample)



#### **Applications**

The number of applications received by Schools of Architecture for courses commencing in October 2019 is the highest number recorded. The figure for Validated Schools is 8 per cent higher than the previous year. This is the equivalent of 6.1 applications per place filled.



#### Entry qualifications

A-Levels, Scottish Highers or International Baccalaureate remain the most popular entry qualifications amongst students starting Part 1. More than half, 55 per cent of new entrants to Part 1 entered with these qualifications. Level 3 qualifications (including vocational 16-19) were the next most popular type of entry, for 24 per cent of new entrants. Three per cent entered with Level 4 or 5, 7 per cent entered with an overseas qualification. This year there were very few 'mature' entrants.

#### New entrants to Part 1

A total of 4,367 students entered RIBA validated Part 1 architecture courses in 2019/20. This is 1 per cent lower than last year's figure, and ends a very long series of year on year increases. But last year's figure was a larger jump than usual - 11 per cent - so this year's number remains the second highest number of new entrants ever reported.

The proportion of female students on validated courses is 53 per cent and continues the upward trend.

The number of direct new entrants to the second year of Part 1 validated courses is 244.

Figure 5: New entrants to first year Part 1, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)



Figure 6: New entrants to Part 1 2017/18 (validated courses only)







Figure 7: Ethnic group of UK new entrants to first year Part 1, 2019/20



Excluding where ethnic group was not known or not recorded, the UK student intake at the 45 Schools able to provide information is 64 per cent white. Twelve per cent are Asian or Asian British, 6 per cent Black or Black British, 7 per cent are mixed or multiple ethnic groups. Another 11 per cent are from other ethnic groups.

The number of students entering Part 1 from outside the UK is very slightly lower than last year's number, accounting for 32 per cent of all entrants. This proportion of new entrants from outside the UK has remained at around one in three for the last four years.

Within this relatively stable picture, the proportion of students coming from EU countries has been rising since 2015/16, while the proportion from Asia has fallen back. This year, 40 per cent of students from outside the UK are from Europe and 43 per cent from countries in Asia.

Figure 9: Group of new entrants from outside the UK to first year Part 1, 2019/20 (validated courses only)




Figure 10: New entrants from outside the UK to first year Part 1 by area of group, trends over last five years (validated courses only)



#### New entrants to Part 2

The number of students entering RIBA validated Part 2 courses in 2019/20 is 2,259. This is 2 per cent lower than last year's figure, but, like Part 1, last year's Part 2 figure was substantially higher than the previous year. So just like Part 1, this year's Part 2

figure is the second highest ever recorded. The proportion of new entrants to Part 2 who are female is 53 per cent, a substantially higher proportion than in the previous year and the first time that female students form the majority.

Figure 12: New entrants to Part 2 2019/20 (validated courses only)



Nearly three in four (73 per cent) of students who enter Part 2 have a UK first degree; another 4 per cent have a UK second degree. Four per cent enter with a European degree while 19 per cent have a qualification from outside Europe. These proportions are in line with figures from recent years.

Figure 13: Qualifications of new entrants to Part 2, 2019/20






Figure 14: Ethnic group of UK new entrants to first year Part 2, 2019/20



At Part 2, 40 Schools were able to provide information about ethnic group. Excluding new entrants whose ethnic group is not known, at Part 2 the UK student intake is 66 per cent white; 13 per cent are Asian or Asian British; and 7 per cent Black or Black British. Six per cent are of mixed or multiple group and a further 6 per cent are from an other ethnic background.

Last year's rise in the number of students entering Part 2 from outside the UK has been sustained this year, with a further rise of 2 per cent.

Slightly fewer students entered Part 2 from countries in the EU this year compared with last, but more came from Asian countries and the rest of the world.

Figure 16: Group of new entrants from outside the UK to first year Part 2, 2019/20 (validated courses only)




Figure 17: New entrants from outside the UK to first year Part 2 by area of group, trends over last five years (validated courses only)



### Students of all academic years

Nearly 17,000 students are studying architecture at Part 1 and Part 2 (validated courses). This is 4 per cent higher than in the previous year. The proportion of students undertaking part-time courses is gradually rising and is up to 5 per cent this year.

Figure 18: All students, 2019/20 (validated courses only)




Figure 19: Students of all years, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)

#### Age of new entrants

#### Part 1

The most popular age of entry into a Part 1 course is 18 years; while over 80 per cent of students enter the first year of the Part 1 course at ages 18, 19 or 20. The median age of entry is 19 years.

Figure 20: Age of New Entrants to Part 1 courses 2019/20 (validated courses only)



#### Part 2

More students enter into a Part 2 course at age 23 than any other age. A total of 64 per cent of students enter at ages 22, 23 or 24. The median age of entry is 23.5 years.

Figure 21: Age of New Entrants to Part 2 courses 2019/20 (validated courses only)



#### **Examination results**

These figures refer to examinations taken during the academic year 2018/19. A total of 1,590 students passed Part 3 exams in 2018/19. This continues the long-term upward trend, which has seen about 100 more passes at Part 3 every year for the last three years.

The number of students passing Part 1 examinations is also higher although the number has fallen significantly, by 13 per cent, at Part 2.

Examination pass rates were 91 per cent at Part 1, 91 per cent at Part 2, and 84 per cent at Part 3.

Figure 22: Examination results, 2018/19 (validated courses only) (\* see note below)




Figure 23: Examination passes, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)





Figure 24: Examination grades Part 1, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)


#### Progression of female students

In this comparison of cohorts of students over time we assume that students take Part 1 finals in Year 3, Part 2 finals in Year 6 and Part 3 finals in Year 7 of their seven year education.

Historically the figures suggest a female drop-out rate of about 2 to 3 percentage points between Parts 1 and 2, and another 2 to 3 percentage points between Parts 2 and 3. The relationship between the proportion of female students applying and entering Part 1 is very close in most years. The gap between the proportion of female students at Part 1 and Part

2 has continued to close, narrowing from about 2 percentage points at the start of this analysis to closer to 1 percentage point in recent years. While the gap between Parts 2 and 3 has narrowed from about 4 percentage points to around 2.

The figures show that there has been a long-term rise in the proportion of female students at all stages. Female students now are the majority of applicants and new entrants to Part 1 and - from this year - entering Part 2.

#### Ethnic group of students

This analysis excludes students whose ethnic group is not known and is not provided by all Schools. The proportion of new entrants to Part 1 who are White is 61 per cent. The proportion of students who are White then rises with each consecutive stage; 67 per cent of new entrants to Part 2 are White, increasing to 76 per cent of students passing their Part 3 examination.

The information has been analysed to track cohorts of students. The analysis shows that the proportion of students who are White has fallen over time, at all stages of architectural education. Furthermore, the gap between entering Part 1 and entering Part 2 appears to have declined over time although there is some considerable variability between individual years' data.

Definitions:

White - British, Irish or any other White background.

Black or Black British including Caribbean, African or any other black background. Asian or Asian British - Indian, Pakistani, Bangladeshi or any other Asian background. Mixed or Multiple - White and Black African, White and Black Caribbean, White and Asian or any other mixed background.

Other - Chinese or any other ethnic group.

#### Staffing

1,819 staff are employed in the validated Schools of Architecture. This is the full-time equivalent figure (FTE). Almost three quarters of these are teaching staff. This year's staffing numbers are very slightly lower than those reported last year mainly due to a small fall in the number of part-time teaching staff.

Averaged across all Schools, the student to teaching staff ratio is 12.3 this year. This ratio is higher than in recent years and is the first time since 2015/16 that the ratio is above 12.

Figure 26: Teaching staff, full-time equivalent, 2019/20




Figure 27: Staffing numbers, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)





Nine per cent of students have disclosed a disability. The largest source of disability remains a learning impairment.


The number of students who have disclosed a disability has been higher in the last two years than previously. Learning impairment remains the most significant disclosed disability.

#### Mental Health

About 3 per cent of students have a disclosed mental health issue. The total number of students with a disclosed mental health issue continues to rise, having doubled in two years.

This probably reflects greater awareness of reporting and efforts to create a climate which makes it less difficult for students to disclose this information.

Figure 30: Students with a disclosed mental health issue, 2019/20




Figure 31: Number of students with a disclosed mental health issue, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)


