RIBA Education Statistics 2020/21

The RIBA Education Department conducts an annual survey of schools of architecture; these data establish key facts about architectural education in the UK. Collection of accurate data is essential for any professional organisation; this survey allows the RIBA to understand trends in this sector, and forms the basis for responses to government, media, and other bodies. This document describes the results of the survey for 2020/21, comparing results with figures for the last five years.

We would like to thank all heads of architecture and departmental administrators for responding so positively to this year's survey, and for providing all the detailed information we require. We are pleased to report that all but one UK RIBA validated schools participated in this year's survey.

This year's figures show that Schools of Architecture are continuing to grow. Once again, most of the figures are 'all -time highs' - applications to Part 1, entrants to Part 1, entrants to Part 2, teaching staff, examination passes at Part 3 and Part 1. Also at an all-time high are total student numbers, which are almost 21,000. There are approaching 19,000 students at Parts 1 and 2 in Validated Schools, plus more than 2,000 students who sat their Part 3 examinations. In addition to the 21,000 headline figure are another 700 students in Candidate Schools.

For the first time we examine Apprentices. Numbers have been rising and there are now 327 Apprentices studying at the Schools of Architecture. We will develop our analyses of Apprentices as these courses progress.

Fewer students are entering Schools from outside the UK. At both Part 1 and Part 2, numbers are down this year. Proportionally fewer students have come from EU countries and proportionally more from Asia.

The student population is becoming more balanced and more diverse. Very nearly half (48 per cent) of students passing Part 2 and Part 3 are female, while female students now account for 55 per cent of applications and 55 per cent of new entrants to Part 1. Among new entrants to Part 1, 17 per cent are from an Asian background and 9 per cent are Black. These proportions are rising long-term.









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Apprentices

This is the first year in which we have explicitly examined data relating to Apprentices. In the academic year 2020/21, 18 Apprentices entered Part 1 and 93 entered Part 2 courses. In total, there are currently 327 Apprentices in Validated Schools.



Applications

The number of applications continues to grow. Applications received by Schools of Architecture for courses commencing in October 2020 are, again, the highest number recorded, having risen by 1 per cent. This is the equivalent of 5.9 applications per place filled.



Entry qualifications

The most popular entry qualifications amongst students starting Part 1 remains A-Levels, Scottish Highers or International Baccalaureate. Over half, 59 per cent, of new entrants to Part 1 entered with these qualifications. Next most popular were Level 3 qualifications (including vocational 16-19), offered by 31 per cent of new entrants. Four per cent entered with Level 4 or 5, while an overseas qualification was offered by 5 per cent of new entrants to Part 1. Very few students were 'mature' entrants or had 'other' qualifications.

New entrants to Part 1

A total of 4,664 students entered RIBA validated Part 1 architecture courses in 2020/21. This is 7 per cent higher than last year's figure, and continues the long-term upward trend. This year's figure is another all-time high.

The proportion of female students on validated courses is 55 per cent, greater than last year's 53 per cent and continuing the long-term upward trend. The number of direct new entrants to the second year of Part 1 validated courses is 237.

Figure 4: New entrants to Part 1 2020/21 (validated courses only)







Figure 5: Ethnic group of UK new entrants to first year Part 1, 2020/21



Excluding where ethnic group was not known or not recorded, the UK student intake at the 47 Schools able to provide information is 60 per cent white. Seventeen per cent are Asian or Asian British, 9 per cent Black or Black British, 8 per cent are mixed or multiple ethnic backgrounds. Six per cent are from other ethnic backgrounds.

Figure 6: New entrants from outside the UK to first year Part 1, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)




The number of students entering Part 1 from outside the UK has, again, edged slightly down from last year's number. Students from outside the UK now account for 35 per cent of all entrants to Part 1, this is in line with the average over the last five years.

The proportion of new entrants coming from the EU has fallen back this year, to about a quarter. More students have entered from Asia and the rest of the world.



New entrants to Part 2

The number of students entering RIBA validated Part 2 courses in 2020/21 is 2,373. This is 5 per cent higher than last year's figure, although last year's figure was lower than the previous year's figure. Nevertheless, this year's increase means that the

number of students entering Part 2 is at an alltime high. The proportion of female new entrants to Part 2 is 48 per cent (validated Schools only), lower than the 52 per cent figure recorded last year although last year's proportion was unusually high.

Figure 9: New entrants to Part 2, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)



Figure 10: New entrants to Part 2 2020/21 (validated courses only)



Almost four out of five students (79 per cent) who enter Part 2 have a UK first degree. Two per cent have a UK second degree. Three per cent enter with a European degree while 9 per cent have a qualification from outside Europe. These proportions are similar to figures recorded in previous years.

Figure 11: Qualifications of new entrants to Part 2, 2020/21






Figure 12: Ethnic group of UK new entrants to first year Part 2, 2020/21



At Part 2, 42 Schools were able to provide information about ethnic group. Excluding new entrants whose ethnic group is not known, at Part 2 the UK student intake is 71 per cent white; 11 per cent Asian or Asian British; 6 per cent Black or Black British. Six per cent are of mixed or multiple ethnic backgrounds and a further 7 per cent are from an other ethnic background.

Figure 13: New entrants from outside the UK to first year Part 2, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)




Fewer students entered Part 2 from outside the UK this year compared with the previous two years. This year's number is 845 and means that 36 per cent of all new entrants were from outside the UK.

This proportion is still greater than it was in any year before 2018/19. Within this year's cohort, the share of new entrants to Part 2 from the EU has fallen.



Students of all academic years

More than 18,600 students are studying architecture at Part 1 and Part 2 (validated courses). This is an increase of 10 per cent compared with the previous year and means that this year the number is at an all-time high. Recent rises in the proportion of students undertaking part-time courses have been reversed this year.

Figure 16: All students, 2020/21 (validated courses only)




Figure 17: Students of all years, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)



Age of new entrants

Part 1

Very nearly half of students enter into a Part 1 course at the age of 18 years. Nearly one quarter enter at the age of 19 years. The median age of entry is 18 years, younger than recently.

Figure 18: Age of New Entrants to Part 1 courses 2020/21 (validated courses only)



Part 2

About one quarter of students enter into a Part 2 course at age 23, and nearly one quarter enter at age 22. The median age of entry is 23 years, like Part 1 this is slightly younger than in previous years.

Figure 19: Age of New Entrants to Part 2 courses 2020/21 (validated courses only)



Geographic movement of students

This analysis of students tracks cohorts of students as they move between home, Part 1 School and Part 2 School.

Students travel 72 miles from home, on average, to study for Part 1. The average is lower, 51 miles, for Part 2.

The North and the Midlands/East Anglia emerge as the parts of the UK where there is a net in-flow of architecture students leaving their home region to study at Part 1. While at Part 2, London appears to have the highest retention rate.

Figure 20: Average distance between home and School, new entrants to Part 1, 2020/21





Figure 21: Average distance between home and School, new entrants to Parts 1 and 2, analysed by location of School, 2020/21


Examination results

These figures refer to examinations taken during the academic year 2019/20. A total of 1,854 students passed Part 3 examinations. This is an all-time high figure and continues the consistently rising pattern that has been seen in recent years.

The number of students passing Part 1 examinations has increased very slightly this year and becomes a new all-time high figure, too. The number of students passing Part 2 examinations is higher than last year but lower than in 2017/18.

Examination pass rates were 90 per cent at Part 1, 95 per cent at Part 2, and 83 per cent at Part 3.

Figure 23: Examination results, 2019/20 (validated courses only) (* see note below)



Progression of female students

In this comparison of cohorts of students over time we assume that students take Part 1 finals in Year 3, Part 2 finals in Year 6 and Part 3 finals in Year 7 of their seven year education.

Historically the figures suggest a female drop-out rate of about 2 to 3 percentage points between Parts 1 and 2, and another 2 to 3 percentage points between Parts 2 and 3. The relationship between the proportion of female students applying and entering Part 1 has been within one percentage point in most recent years. The gap between the proportion

of female students at Part 1 and Part 2 has been closing long-term, although this year's gap is wider than recently. The gap between Parts 2 and 3 has also narrowed long-term, from about 4 percentage points to around 2.

The data show that there has been a long-term rise in the proportion of female students at all stages. Female students reached 50 per cent of applications five years ago, this proportion has continued to rise and now stands at 55 per cent.




Figure 26: Trends in the progression of female students (validated courses only)

Ethnic group of students

This analysis excludes students whose ethnic group is not known and is not provided by all Schools. The proportion of new entrants to Part 1 who are White is 60 per cent. The proportion of students who are White then rises with each consecutive stage; 71 per cent of new entrants to Part 2 are white, increasing to 79 per cent of students passing their Part 3 examination.

The information has been analysed to track cohorts of students. The analysis shows that the proportion of students who are White has fallen over time, at all stages of architectural education. Furthermore, the gap between entering Part 1 and entering Part 2 appears to have declined over time although there is some considerable variability between individual years' data.

Definitions:

White - British, Irish or any other White background.

Black or Black British including Caribbean, African or any other black background. Asian or Asian British - Indian, Pakistani, Bangladeshi or any other Asian background. Mixed or Multiple - White and Black African, White and Black Caribbean, White and Asian or any other mixed background.

Other - Chinese or any other ethnic background.

Staffing

2,163 staff are employed in the validated Schools of Architecture. This is the full-time equivalent figure (FTE). More than three quarters of staff are teaching staff. The number of staff employed has recovered from last year's relative low. Over the last two years the number of part-time teaching staff has fallen back; this year it has increased significantly. Averaged across all Schools, the student to teaching staff ratio is 11.2 this year. This ratio is the lowest it has been in five years. Despite the rise in the number of staff, there has been a greater rise in the number of students.

Figure 28: Staffing numbers, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)







Mental Health

About 4 per cent of students have a disclosed mental health issue. The total number of students with a disclosed mental health issue has increased every year. This probably reflects greater awareness of reporting and efforts to create a climate which

makes it less difficult for students to disclose this information. It highlights that students can get help and support with issues that may have gone hidden before.

Figure 31: Students with a disclosed mental health issue, 2020/21




Figure 32: Number of students with a disclosed mental health issue, trends over the last five years (validated courses only)


