Resilience and agility in a changing climate: reclaiming architect as a verb

While at Grimshaw Architects, Muyiwa founded and was chair of the Multi-Ethnic Group and Allies staff network as well as being an external speaker and mentor for aspiring architects at the Grimshaw Foundation, which exists to encourage greater social mobility within architecture.

In the wider industry, Muyiwa is known for presenting at Practice Clinics focused on EDI leadership and participating in panels, events, and radio programmes on behalf of RIBA. He is also a regular contributor to the next generation of architects as an Ambassador for the Mayor of London: Design Future London challenge.

Muyiwa also co-founded a design-tech venture called Modulor, focused on making Digital Twins of spaces affordable.



Rion Willard The Business of Architecture

Rion is an architect turned architecture business consultant. He began his career under notable firms such as Grimshaw and RSHP, and later began his own practice, TTHS architects. He now consults architectural practice owners around the world to help them grow and design their practices. In the early days of running TTHS, he was met with many business obstacles that frustrated and confused him. The constant financial anxiety and stress drove him to a point where he decided he had to understand everything he could about running a business. This led him to interview successful business leaders within the AEC industry on a global scale, which is now known as the Business of Architecture UK Podcast. Rion continually invests in furthering his education on the subject of running a successful practice, including marketing, selling, and even the psychology of people and teams. His relationships with industry experts, business consultants, and leadership mentors have helped him understand and better consult other practice owners on what makes a profitable and impactful practice. He is now the Director of Consulting at Business of Architecture where he has personally consulted with over 100 architecture practice owners to implement the SMART Practice Method[™]. His ultimate desire is to help other architects create a practice that gives them fulfilment, freedom, and exceptional finances.


With collaboration in mind, Jennifer nurtures a working relationship with every client and each project receives her expert attention from beginning-to-end resulting in consistently good value, great work.




Lindsay Faller Cloudfields
