Advocating for social justice and sustainable practices

Social justice is an underlying principle for peaceful and prosperous coexistence within and among nations. The concept of social justice advocates for equal access to wealth, opportunities, and privileges within a society. It underscores the progressive march towards a world where the barriers that people face because of gender, age, race, ethnicity, religion, culture, or disability are dismantled. Its intrinsic relationship with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) is anchored in the shared vision of a better world, as espoused in the United Nations' 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The SDGs are a call for action to end poverty, protect the planet, and ensure that all people enjoy peace and prosperity. These 17 interlinked goals recognise that strategies to improve health and education, reduce inequality, and spur economic growth must go hand-in-hand with tackling climate change and working to preserve our oceans and forests.

Social justice permeates each SDG, insisting that no goal can be met without meeting the needs of the most vulnerable and marginalized populations. <https://sdgresources.relx.com/social-justice-0>

Prof. Zhang Jie

ZHANG Jie is a professor and architect in the field of heritage conservation and urban renewal. He has been lecturing at School of Architecture, Tsinghua University in China since 1992 and has been the dean of the School of Architecture and Urban Planning at Beijing University of Civil Engineering and Architecture since 2020. He is a Chartered Member of RIBA, an Honorary Membership of International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS) and a chairholder of the UNESCO on Heritage Conservation Planning and Sustainable Social Development.

Prof. ZHANG Jie's research lies in the inter-discipline of architecture and conservation and in investigating a sustainable development model for cities undergoing drastic changes, considering culture, ecology, economy, and community improvement in the context of rapid urbanization.

He has published 20 academic monographs and more than 100 academic papers. He has won the RIBA International Awards for Excellence, Gold Award in International Design Awards, Award of Distinction and Award for New Design in Heritage Contexts in UNESCO Asia-Pacific Awards for Cultural Heritage Conservation, and more than 40 national awards in China by his representative works, including Jingdezhen Ceramic Industry Museum, Conservation of Sanfang Qixiang, Jingdezhen Pengjia Alley Compound and Tsinghua University Nankou National Key Laboratory Base. He was awarded National Master of Engineering Design and Geotechnique Investigation in China in 2020. His works were displayed in the Chinese Architecture Exhibition of the 27th World Congress of Architects, the China Pavilion at Venice Biennale 2020, and China, Architecture exhibition in Lyon, France.

Joori Chun is the co-founding principal of 9DIRECTORS AND COMPANY, a multidisciplinary design firm founded in 2014, and 9ARCHITECTUS, an architecture-focused practice launched in 2015. Together, these firms operate as 9DA, blending architecture, urbanism, branding, exhibitions, and technology to push creative boundaries and explore new forms of engagement.

Joori's work redefines traditional architectural roles by transforming the architect into a director, fostering interdisciplinary collaboration. Under her leadership, 9DA integrates design, communication, and tailored solutions to achieve meaningful and sustainable outcomes. The firm embraces experimentation, drawing from diverse perspectives to reinterpret classical principles across multiple disciplines.

9DA's work has been recognized both nationally and internationally, earning awards such as the 2022 Korea Space Culture Award and the 2020 Korea Architectural Culture Award. The firm has also been featured several times in *100 Architects of the Year*. Collaborating with architects, artists, and designers, 9DA creates distinct project identities and extends architecture's role into installation art and branding initiatives.

Joori Chun is an adjunct professor at Kookmin University and previously taught at Gachon University. She holds a Bachelor of Architecture from SCI-Arc (Southern California Institute of Architecture) and a Master's in Architecture and Urban Design from Hongik University.

He mokopuna nā Te Huhuti, nāna i kau i tāna tau ā Te Whatuiāpiti. (I am a grandchild of Te Huhuti, she who swam to her love, Te Whatuiāpiti),

Arā, nō Kahungunu te iwi ahau (Therefore, I am a descendent of the tribe, Kahungunu).

Whare is a principal and a senior design lead at Warren and Mahoney Architects. He is the lead of the advanced indigenous design unit – Te Matakīrea, dedicated to empowering indigenous architecture in Aotearoa New Zealand, Australia, and the Pacific. His work lies in urban planning, social procurement, community cultural and economic development, and he is a thought-leader on the development of ‘better by design’ strategies that looks at integrating the needs of indigeneity, the possibilities of technology, and the requirements for success in ‘Planet First’ design.

A senior member and committee lead of Ngā Aho Inc, the Māori Design Society, and Acting Co-Director of the IPWP (Indigenous Peoples Work Programme UIA RAIC), Whare has held numerous leadership roles, including being a past Board Director of the Te Kāhui Whaihanga The New Zealand Institute of Architects, and Chair Appointment to the New Zealand Construction Industry Council.

Whare has led co-design innovation across a wide range of sectors including health, education, housing, corrections & justice, climate, creative sector, cultural heritage, language revitalisation, cultural and intellectual property, indigenous strategies and export – in Aotearoa New Zealand, Australia, Hawai’i, and Canada where he worked with First Nations, Industry and Government to develop how design can create economic movement.

By recentring indigenous process and institutions, and endorsing such commitments as the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP), this signifies a new conversation and new ways of working. Whare affirms we can extend this into the ‘new kind of city’ but requires holistic integration, and recentring of indigeneity, the possibilities of technology, and the reimagining of a circular approach to enable us to create places and spaces with more meaning, depth, and understanding.
